Guadalupe River State Park

The Park again welcomed an enthusiastic group of youth and adults from Boy Scout Troop 285 on the chilly morning of Saturday, the 4th of May. Over 65 total volunteers took part in clearing the banks of the river of trash and in improving the trail used by weekly visitors to the Honey Creek State Natural Area. Specifically, the Scouts re-mulched a large section of the trail, as well as repairing an eroded area in the steep section of the trail by creating new steps with new logs and fill dirt.



Following the three-hour work session, all were treated to a delectable lunch of sausage and beans, provided by the Friends of the Park and other volunteers, at the river-front day-use area. The troop then retired to another area of the Park to enjoy a campout experience that night. This work activity is scheduled twice each year and is the recurring service project of Boy Scout Troop 285, based at Coker Methodist Church in San Antonio. It is led by Scoutmaster Bill McCalister, who has served in this capacity for the past 36 years.

Announcement Honey Creek Interpretive Guide Training

Looking for a new volunteer opportunity that combines the outdoors with cultural and natural history interpretation? Then the Friends of Guadalupe River and Honey Creek would like to invite you to become a Honey Creek Interpretive Guide.

We are offering a four-part training session to be held on Thursday evenings from 6-8 p.m. during August. The specific dates are August 8, 15, 22, and 29. The first evening will include an introduction of what to expect and a short hike led by our current guides which will provide you a first-hand look at what the hike entails. The final three sessions will cover a number of topics specific to Honey Creek as well as interpretive techniques. Each of them will allow you to see the material applied in short hikes. Because becoming an Interpretive Guide is a significant undertaking we are seeking individuals that can make a commitment to lead a minimum of 6 hikes a year, as well as attend all four training sessions. If you are interested please consider registering for this unique volunteer experience.

Eagle Project

The Friends of Guadalupe River State Park/Honey Creek State Natural Area is extremely honored to have had I. Madison "Moose" McNair do his Eagle Project at our park. He led his troop in the following project: Planned, designed, and constructed six 12' X 12' concrete picnic bench pads at the Guadalupe River State Park. Planted trees and installed BBQ grills at each site and planted an additional border of trees around the parking lot. He also built a cedar post fence around a utility area. Madison finished under budget which allowed for a cash donation to the Friends in the amount of \$3149.

On Saturday May 18th, 2013 Madison presented to J.W. Pieper, treasurer of the Friends the check at his Eagle Award Ceremony. This presentation was held at Coker United Method-

ist Church. Also present from the Friends were Dave Kibler, Vice President, Tom Anderson, President and Greg Nash representing the park. The Friends, the park and Troop 285 have a long standing relationship of projects that the troop has assisted us with to make a better park for all. 








Wehe Brothers of Anhalt, Texas By Brenda Anderson-Lindemann

The early Krause settlement included 3 of the thirteen children born to Dr. Fritz Wehe in Anhalt, Dessau. The three Wehe brothers - Friedrich, Heinrich and Carl were born in 1822, 1831 & 1836 respectively. Friedrich, the oldest, was the first brother to immigrate: in 1851 he sailed from Bremen, Germany on the ship "Franciscka." He was followed to Texas in 1854 by his two younger brothers, Heinrich and Carl,

who immigrated together on the ship "Antoinette". By the late 1850's all three were located in the Anhalt area, taking up both farming and the practice of freighting; moving goods and people between the coast and westward onto Fredericksburg and other destinations.



churned into 520 pounds of butter. Carl Wehe had improved 8 acres and 152 unimproved acres of land. He owned 4 horses, 4 milk cows, 3 other cattle, 3 swine, 11 working oxen for his freighter-work that he shared with his brother, Heinrich Wehe. The report estimated the value of the livestock at \$466 and the farm had produced 8 bushels of Indian corn during the past year. Unfortunately, only Heinrich survived post-Civil War, as both Friedrich and Carl died in 1864. Heinrich lived another 40+ years on his land; his passing was in 1907. He was a charter member of the 1875 Farmer's Club and the 1876 Germania Farmer Verein. Hilmar Wehe, our Homesteader Homecoming host, is the Great Grandson of Heinrich Wehe.


News from the Park

As we embark on another sure-to-be busy summer, we want to be sure to invite everyone to come out to Guadalupe River State Park and enjoy the beauty of the river, whether you canoe, kayak, swim, fish or just want to sit in the water and relax. We also have miles of hiking trails in the park proper as well as on the Bauer Unit north of the river.

If you are looking to join in on fun learning and exploration, check out our website for a host of programs being offered this summer. From insect catching to full moon and other night walks, we have something to offer for everyone. We also encourage you to stop by the Discovery Center and "Take Another Look" with our exhibits and hands-on materials. You'll discover that there is something there for everyone – and it has air conditioning to take the chill off those hot afternoons.

You'll soon be seeing a few new faces in the park as said goodbye to long-time employee Bill Beach who retired from TPWD after serving many years in the office, most recently as Office Manager, as well as to Georgia



Davis, who moved on to a new position in San Antonio. Assistant Park Manager Clay Boone also departed for Government Canyon State Park. We miss them all but will be welcoming new staff as soon as the hiring process for each position is completed. One significant project going on in the park this summer involves a new Ashe juniper removal project. A contractor has recently begun shredding juniper on a 200-acre area on the east side of the park road. As a result, and for the safety of our guests, the trails there have been and will remain closed for the next two months. Following this effort, a controlled or managed burn of the area will be done (within the next year or two) to re-introduce native vegetation similar to what was found here at the time of European settlement.

We do have a few volunteer opportunities for anyone interested this summer. This June 27th we'll once again be surveying butterflies as an on-going effort to monitor butterfly populations. This nation-wide effort, hosted by the North American Butterfly Association, has been going on for many years both here and across the country. You do not have to be an expert in butterfly identification to participate! Contact Craig Hensley at 830.438.7653 or by email at <u>craig.hensley@tpwd.state.tx.us</u> if you would like more information or to participate. We are also doing monthly butterfly counts to better understand the annual cycles of our local scale-winged wonders. You can also join this effort by contacting Craig.

Another volunteer opportunity is available with the on-going bird banding programs at the park and in Honey Creek. If you are interested in learning more about becoming a bird banding assistant, please notify Craig, as well.

San Antonio Christian Schools 6th Grade Field Trip

Ninety-seven 6th graders visited Guadalupe River State Park for a full day field trip. Park Ranger Craig Hensley, along with Tom Anderson, Friends Board President and volunteer, and Emily Wiener, volunteer, provided three of the four activities for the children. Craig did a bird banding demonstration while Emily guided students through the dissection of owl pellets and Tom led the students on a plant adaptations walk.

By all accounts the students had a great time, learned a lot and we know that the School will be returning next year and is already talking about expanding the program to include 7^{th} and 8^{th} graders.

Lackland Elementary School Field Trip

Thirty-six students from Lackland Elementary made the 90-minute journey to the Park during May, engaging in activities focused on birds. Bird banding, owl pellet dissection, a guided bird walk and participating in a bird migration game rounded out the activities for these children.

Discovery Center

The Discovery Center continues to be a hit with park guests of all ages. Over the course of the past 12 months, we have set new record highs for visitation for each month. Many thanks go to the wonderful group of community volunteers that donate their time on Saturdays and Sundays to make our guests visits memorable.

Beginning in early June, the Discovery Center will be open from Tuesdays through Sundays. If you haven't had the chance to visit the Discovery Center yet, or it's been awhile, come on out!

2013 Membership Dues Are Now Payable


